


REFLECTIONS FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL

reat teaching at its heart is about inspiring students-about nurturing in the individual student a belief that they can, even when getting there is hard. Great teaching is about catching a student when they fall short; it's about helping them see and appreciate what they were able to accomplish even as they commit to a new goal. Great teaching is about building relationships of trust and integrity that are unquestioned. It's about mutual respect and being willing to be in the place of learner. Great teaching is about expecting mistakes; indeed, it is about helping students learn to welcome mistakes as opportunities to grow.

At Lab, our teachers embrace the challenge of great teaching. They start every day with a belief in the child in front of them. They recognize each child's unique gifts and strengths. They base their work on the absolute conviction that children can use their individual gifts and strengths to overcome their challenges.

Never has great teaching been more important than in the last 18 months. Through every pivot we've undertaken as a school—virtual teaching and learning, a hybrid environment, in-person teaching and learning with masks and social distancing—Lab teachers have delivered on our mission to develop students who can "advocate for themselves as they become engaged and compassionate members of a global society." As I reflect on my first months as head of school, my overwhelming emotion is gratitude. I am grateful to work with this team of dedicated educators who come to work every day with the determination to empower each and every student they teach. I am grateful for our parents, who entrust us with their children's education and partner with us in their social and emotional development as compassionate and caring human beings. I am grateful for our students, who inspire me with their creativity, their enthusiasm for learning, and their ability to care for each other and the world around them. I am grateful to our dedicated Board of Trustees, including our outgoing Chair of the Board Bill Tennis who has been a stalwart and steadfast leader throughout his tenure and especially in this unprecedented year. And, I am grateful to each of you who through your philanthropic support demonstrate your belief in the fundamental importance of our mission.

As we look ahead to another academic year, I am pleased to report that Lab will begin the 2021–2022 school year with 388 students on our Foxhall and Reservoir campuses in-person five days a week. Our brand-new Global Division has already enrolled an additional six students, spanning the globe from both

I feel privileged, indeed, to lead this exceptional school as we deliver on our promise of excellence in education for students with language-based learning differences. years later became vice chair. I have the utmost confidence that Kate will lead the Board with great purpose and insight.

As for the fiscal health of the school, we faced particular challenges in the beginning of the year. The Board made the decision to expand resources to increase staff for smaller cohorts and provide classroom facilitators for teachers who continued to teach virtually. We spent significant amounts on risk mitigation, we built new temporary classrooms in the gym for our Junior High, and we expanded our financial aid. All of this came at a cost. However, we also saw the generosity of our community. The Lab School community stepped up philanthropically to support the Lab School Fund and a virtual Gala, and we benefitted from a very well-timed PPP loan. We are incredibly appreciative to donors and the Board for continuing their support of the school, especially during a very difficult pandemic year.

As I step down as Board chair after five years, I extend countless thanks and deep gratitude to the whole Lab School community. It has been an honor to lead the Board, to work closely with two extraordinary heads of school, and to be among so many intelligent and thoughtful people with the shared goal of offering the best education to students with learning differences.

Kate Fulton has been devoted to The Lab School since her daughter, Grace Kyle '19 started as a first-year Elementary

student. "From the start, as a parent, I was so incredibly grateful to Lab for all that they were doing to help Grace become her best self in and beyond school. I felt a great passion to give back," says Ms. Fulton who for many years served on the Gala Corporate Committee before joining the Board of Trustees in 2011. She became vice chair of the Board in 2016. A managing director at BlackRock where she heads the company's US public policy team and also heads its Washington, DC office, Ms. Fulton-in her role as Board chair-plans to continue to make sure that The Lab School is the gold standard for students with learning differences. "I want to follow in Bill's footsteps [Immediate Past Chair **Bill Tennis**] who has been devoted to ensuring the financial stability of the school. And I want to collaborate with Kim [Head of School Kim Wargo] to make sure our goals are aligned," she says. "As a board, our primary responsibility is financial stewardship, which in turn helps us attract not only students who need our

school but also the top-notch faculty and staff who are experts in the field of learning differences education. It's competitive out there; we want to make sure the programs, facilities, learning opportunities, and extra-curricular activities we offer our community are the best they can be."

JOE CLARK



Joe Clark comes from a family with a rich legacy in education. His grandparents worked tirelessly to help desegregate schools in

South Carolina. His brother is named after a sharecropper turned principal known for transforming the lives of many students of color. And Mr. Clark, himself, says that although he is an attorney by trade, education is part of his ethos, part of his life's calling.

Vice President and Senior Deputy General Counsel at Comcast NBC Universal, Mr. Clark is also chairman of the DC Retirement Board. He is a graduate of Morehouse College and Harvard Law School. His son, **Theodore Clark**, a rising fourth grader, began his third year at Lab this fall. "Theo needed a school that could understand and embrace his unique learning styles, and empower him to succeed," says Mr. Clark. "And it's happening. During his short time at Lab, we have watched him grow with measured success, not just academically but also in his confidence and enthusiasm."

Mr. Clark, who has served on the board of another independent school for six years, believes vehemently in giving back. "I view my service on Lab's Board as a longtime commitment. I plan to listen and learn, primarily, during my first year, but going forward, what is important to me is building an endowment. I believe that when a school is fiscally sound with a strong endowment, the leadership can focus more intently on the vision of the school, on the mission—in this case—of providing a first-rate education for these amazing kids who need The Lab School."

Chloe [Intermediate Student **Chloe Corvington**] started at Lab three years ago, we felt—as a family—a meaningful sense of belonging," he says. "It's hard to explain, but walking onto Lab's campus definitely feels like home. We know that Chloe is getting the best education, the best individualized teaching strategies that are clearly helping her thrive academically and socially. And we also know that whatever support we need will be addressed with a superlative level of professionalism, expertise, and commitment."

As senior advisor at Flamboyan Foundation and also board chair of the Writer's Center, Mr. Corvington is deeply knowledgeable about issues around education and education policy. "I am grateful to be a new member of Lab's Board. When you find an organization that has saved your family, you want to give back with your time, your skills—or both," he says.

"When we get together with other Lab families—now friends—we often talk about how at every parent/teacher meeting or call with an administrator, things go smoothly. We feel taken care of, listened to. We know the faculty and staff have our children's best interests at heart, and even more impressive, they genuinely care about our children. I feel like Chloe's teachers really know her on an individual level—and because of that, they understand how best to teach, help, and motivate her ... and ignite her passions."

And he was right," she says. "There is no one favorite thing about being a member of the Lab community; there are manyparent and family engagement activities like "100 Acts of Kindness" and the annual Chili Cook-off; countless playdates and birthday parties with new and returning Lab friends; the kids' athletic events and theater performances where you see new talents in your children emerge and grow; and informal school parking lot parent chats and informational parent panels that affirm your passions and reassure you that you made the right decision to enroll your child at Lab. It really is a friendly community of talented and lovely students, families, and faculty and staff."

A general engineer in the aviation industry, Ms. Lassiter says that as a Lab parent of five years and as a new member of the Board of Trustees, she views The Lab School community as " ... change agents who will ensure that the generations who follow will be well equipped and suited to care for our world. Who wouldn't want to be part of that kind of legacy?"

When thinking about her role as a Board member, she says, "I bring a pure heart to serve, assist, and support wherever I can lend my talents. MARCELO SANGUINETTI AND DANIEL ZELIKOW

On **Maya Sanguinetti-Zelikow '25**'s first day at Lab at age 7, she told her fathers and her brother that she would soon be back at her old school. Two days later, after three full days at Lab, she emphatically redacted her earlier statement, saying, "I'm never



going back to my old school. I have Lab!"

"I think that says it all," remarks her father **Marcelo Sanguinetti**. "That a child would feel so welcome, so integrated into the community in a mere three days is testament to all that The Lab School does."

Before Maya started at Lab, she attended two Lab Summer Programs and also received occupational therapy services. "We were aware of Maya's learning differences from the time she was a little girl, but we didn't know what trajectory we would need to take," says her father Daniel Zelikow. "We definitely found what she needed at Lab. The expertise of the teachers and clinicians are bar none. And we have always been impressed with how Lab not only configures its curriculum for students who learn differently, but also how the school takes a holistic approach. The faculty and staff genuinely get to know each child, which not only helps them succeed academically but also with their social and emotional development. There are a lot of good schools in the DC area, but we believe that Lab operates on a whole other plane as a school for students with learning differences."

Mr. Sanguinetti, who has volunteered countless hours of his time as a member, then president of PALS—five and two years respectively—and also for the last six years spearheading the

Gala's auction, says he and his husband believe strongly in giving back in whatever ways they can. "Maya's future will be different now because of Lab, and for that we are forever grateful," he says. "And personally, I cherish the Lab community; working with other parents to do what we can for the school is incredibly fulfilling."

Mr. Zelikow adds, "Learning differences reach families of every walk of life, every economic category. If we can help other students receive the kind of education that Maya has, then, we feel it's our responsibility to give what we can. We want other families to be able to say, 'We get to send our child to Lab!'"

From that third day of school during her first year, Maya took ownership of her new school "When she talks about Lab—whether her love of Industrialists Club in Intermediate or her ever-expanding interest in science—she speaks with great pride," says Mr. Zelikow. "Having a deep sense of belonging and knowing you have the support needed to succeed have been game changers for Maya—for all of us."
